



 Set comprehensive standards for cruise ship, including safety, security, crewmember protections, and environmental practices.



Classification Societies

- Set safety and environmental rules and guidelines and provide oversight for ship design, construction, and operation.
- Conduct inspections and surveys on behalf of flag states, insurers, and other members of the maritime community to make sure ships are seaworthy and managed responsibly.



Statewide Economic Impacts

Out-of-state visitors to Alaska resulted in an estimated \$158 million in State of Alaska revenues in 2023, as outlined in the following table. All figures reflect 2023 calendar year revenues unless otherwise noted. The largest sources of revenues were Alaska Railroad (\$45 million), the Commercial Passenger Vessel Tax (\$36 million), and Fish & Game licenses/tags (\$28 million).


